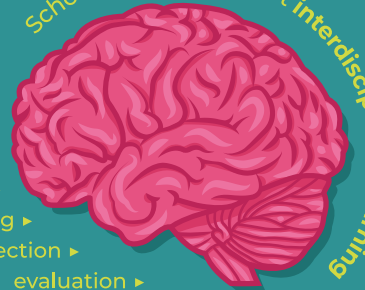
Provide equitable access to resources to help communities cater for:
